
This responds to your request on behalf of Mr. (b) (6)
(b) (6) (C (b) (6)) concerning his possible exposure to
herbicides in Korea.

As stated in the May 10, 1996 response sent to the office of
the Honorable John Glenn in Toledo, Ohio, concerning Mr. (b) (6)'s
request, U.S. military records state that Agents Orange, Blue, and
Monuron were sprayed in the area of the demilitarized zone (DMZ)
in Korea in 1968 and 1969. The records indicate that the actual
spraying was conducted by Republic of Korea (ROK) personnel using
hand held and trailer mounted spray apparatus. The records
further indicate that U.S. military personnel only advised the ROK
personnel and did not actually spray. Historical maps indicate
that Camp Casey, the location provided by Mr. (b) (6), was near the
DMZ in Korea.

We have enclosed copies of the updated Department of Veterans
Affairs Agent Orange Briefs and the Agent Orange Review for Mr.
(b) (6)'s information. —
